## MORROW-GILLIAM COUNTY GAMES

### Ione Loses First Game of Season to Arlington.

Ione lost the opening game of the Morrow-Gilliam County League series on the Arlington grounds, last Sunday by a score of three to two.

The game went 11 innings before Arlington put across the winning run on an error and a single. The game developed into a pitcher's battle from the first inning, Arlington putting two runs across, in the seventh on 2 hits, a sacrifice and an error. Ione didn't tally until the ninth, when they tied the score on two hits and two errors. Davis the local twirler, struck out 15 men and allowed only six hits, but poor fielding in the pinches cost him the game, not an earned run being charged against him.

Woolsey, the opposing pitcher, struck out four and was touched for eight hits. In the ninth he was relieved by Montague, who held the Ionians hitless.

Ione plays at home next Sunday, taking on Heppner, who fell before the slants of Kewpie Clow, last Sunday, by the score of four to one.

### FEDERAL FUNDS FOR OREGON HIGHWAYS

For forest highways in Oregon and Washington, \$948,000 of federal funds have been appropriated for the fiscal year 1928, beginning July 1, next.

The total Forest Highway fund authorized for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, amounts to \$4,500,000, and is apportioned for highways in or adjacent to national forests in fourteen western states and Alaska.

Oregon receives \$533,000 and Washington \$415,000, under the program as approved by the Secretary of Agriculture and just announced by the District Forester, Portland, Oregon.

## CREDITORS OF BANK OF IONE MEET

### GENERAL STATEMENT MADE BY DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT

#### Advisory Committee Appointed By Creditors

Pursuant to a call of the Deputy State Superintendent of Banks a meeting of creditors of the Bank of Ione was held at Legion hall, Ione, on the 11th inst.

A large majority of the creditors of the Bank were in attendance and listened to a general statement of the bank by Deputy Supt. Guy N. Hickok and L. M. Dempsey.

According to the figures submitted to the meeting, the book value of the assets is \$116,900, segregated as follows: Banking house and fixtures, \$3,500; Notes and Mortgages, \$61,000; Real Estate, \$12,600; Cash, \$4,931; Cash Receipts since Jan. 10, '27, \$2,700.

The sum total of liabilities, exclusive of Capital Stock and Surplus, was stated to be \$71,000; giving an excess of assets over liabilities of approximately \$45,000.

At the suggestion of Deputy Supt. Hickok, an advisory committee of five members was chosen by the creditors.

The function of this committee, it was explained is to advise with the acting Deputy Supt. of Banks in regard to the sale of the real and personal property listed in the assets of the bank.

The five chosen as the Advisory Committee were C. B. Ruley, E. Carlson, Laxton McMurray, Paul Rietmann, and L. P. Davidson.

It was announced that a first dividend of approximately ten per cent would be distributed to the Creditors in a few days.
