EXPORTS AND IMPORTS AT PORT OF PORTLAND

Continued building activity in
the Pacific Northwest has result-
ed in an increased demand for
European construction material
such as cement, iron and steel,
wire fencing, wire rope, nails,
etc., thus furnishing substantial
return cargoes for the vessels
carrying northwest products to
the various markets of the world.

This general increase in nearly
all commodities entering the port
is largely due to the improved
shipping service of our 53 regular
steamship lines serving the port.

Windsor Castle,
Apr. 17, '27.

Editor Independent:

I am just
back from Lone Rock and Hard-
man. I left Ione Saturday, April
9th, and got back Saturday, Apr.
16th. Yes, I had plenty of fresh
air on the trip and I went thro'
some snow between Lone Rock
and Hardman. The ground has
been too wet to plow near both
towns till way late. They were
still seeding. Hardman is about
2000 feet higher than Ione. I stop-
ped on my way out at McDevitt's
McEligott's, Shorty Fellows',
Lundell's, Hogue's, Zinter's, War-
field's, Davidson's, Drake's and
Lovgren's wheat ranches and the
Davidson creek ranch and the
McConkie sheep ranch.

Everyone was busy farming
and lambing. Pretty cold for the
young lambs, but no loss. The
weather has been dry during the
late cold spell.

I looked up the noted lone rock
while I was there. It is a huge
rock about 75 feet long, about 75
feet high and 50 feet wide, locat-
ed at the edge of town near Lone
Rock Creek and the back of a
church so it ought to be a good
rock.

system, broken down sidewalks,
etc., etc.

Giant Arctic Bear

The polar bear is a large bear
(Ursus or Thalarctos maritimus) in-
habiting the Arctic regions of both
the Old and the New world. It at-
tains a length of about 9 feet and of-
ten weighs more than 1,000 pounds.
It frequents the shores and ice floes
and swims well, living largely on
seals. It differs from other bears in
its creamy white color, long neck, nar-
row skull and small molar teeth.

Shocking Affair

Ship's Official Record

Log-book is the book in which the
master of a ship enters each day a
brief but exact account of all the
events of that day, the miles made by
that day's run of the ship, an account
of the weather, and the names of ves-
sels sighted or spoken when names
can be obtained. The log is the offi-
cial record of the voyage.

YOUNG MEN TAUGHT FIRE CARE

Campfire building and control
of fire has been made an import-
ant part of the training at the Y.
M. C. A. summer camp at Spirit
Lake on the Columbia National
Forest. Their plans might well be
followed by other individuals and
groups, according to Forest Serv-
ice men who have seen the system
work at this camp.

The Y. M. C. A. camp director
is deputized as a U. S. Forest Ser-
vice fire guard and given authori-
ty to issue the regular camp fire
permit. When a group of boys
starts out for a hike or a woods
trip, he issues one permit to the
trip leader. As far as possible, lo-
cation and time of all proposed
camping places and camp fires
are set down on the permit and
the forest fire lookouts informed by
telephone.

The trip leader then issues per-
mits to the squad leaders, all of
whom are older boys, for the build-
ing of single camp fires. Before
the permit is issued the trip lead-
er must be satisfied that the fire
is to be located in a safe place.
Before the party leaves the spot
the squad leader puts out the fire
completely, the trip leader in-
spects the work, and they both
initial the permit. All permits
are filed with the camp director
upon return to the main camp. Ab-
solutely no fires are built by the
boys without a permit.

The Y. M. C. A. Spirit Lake
camp has been in continuous op-
eration for 19 years. Every year
an average of not less than 100
individual fires are built by the
boys on these hiking trips, accord-
ing to J. C. Mehan, Y. M. C.
Camp Director. Commenting on
this phase of the work, Mr. Mehan
said: "It has not only been our
aim to teach the correct meth-
od of camp fire building and con-
trol, but to point out to the boys
the reasons why these safeguards
are necessary, and the disastrous
results that follow carelessness
in this direction. In addition to
this practical field training, the
subject of forest fires is dealt
with in the various camping and
woodcraft classes.
