IONE WINS FROM CONDON, 4-3

Local Nine Take Second Straight Game. Now In Tie For Second Place.

Ione defeated Condon on the local diamond last Sunday, 4 to 3. By that victory Ione goes into a tie with Condon for second place in the league standing. With two games won and two games lost. The weather man was very unkind and the boys were forced to play in another windstorm that held up the game and made playing difficult.

"Kewpie" Clow, on the mound for Condon, pitched a much better game than at Condon, allowing nine hits and striking out eight men. Davis, Ione twirler, pitched his usual good game, letting the Condon aggregation down with three hits and not an earned run. Poor support in the pinches allowed the opposing team three runs. Two of these were made in the sixth inning on four errors.

All of Ione's runs were earned. Three hits in a row in the second scored two. A hit, a fielders choice, and a two bagger produced another in the eighth while three hits brought another across in the ninth.

Ione goes to Heppner. Sunday. The latter team took first place in the league by trouncing Arlington 5 to 0.

NOTICE TO WATER CONSUMERS

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Ione, Oregon, held on the 2nd day of May, 1927, the Council of said City set the following rates for water to consumers:

Minimum rate, first 3000 Gals., \$2.00

Each 1000 gallons in excess of 3000 gallons, 30 cents per 1000 gallons.

It was further ordered that consumers be informed, that under section 29, Ordinance No. 63, water rent is due and payable on the 1st day of each month, at the office of the City Marshal, and if payment is not made within ten days thereafter, the water shall be shut off from the premises until payment is made of the amount due together with a 50 cent extra charge against consumer for turning water off and on.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

The French franc is now quoted at 26.37 to the dollar, the highest figure since March.

The British miners have rejected the government proposals for ending the coal strike, which has been in effect since May 1.

More than 20,000 men are said to be in arms in various states of Mexico in a general rebellious movement against the Calles regime.

The deficit of the Philadelphia Sesqui-centennial exposition when it closes, December 1, will be about \$5,250,000. The deficit will be partly financed through diversion of city funds to settlement of the Sesqui bills.

American claimants of damages from Germany because of war losses to their property have renewed their drive before the house ways and means committee against proposals to return approximately \$400,000,000 worth of German property held by the alien property custodian until every American claimant has been satisfied.

Referendum on Dry Law is Asked Washington, D. C.—A resolution proposing a national referendum on prohibition was introduced in the house Monday by Representative Gallivan, Democrat, Massachusetts.

Chehalis Re-elects Mayor West. Chehalis, Wash.—Mayor West was re-elected by a vote of 612 over his opponent, Dr. J. T. Coleman, who received 354 votes.
