REAL BASE BALL

Morrow County Ball Fans Enjoy A Treat

Ione went to Heppner to meet the League leaders after having defeated Condon, two straight. They were handicapped by the absence of Dutch Rietmann, but played the best game of the year.

Cochran hit the first pitched ball out of the lot and made third. Werner Rietmann brought him in with a sacrifice fly to Anderson who ran far into left for the catch. Drake hit to second and was thrown out. Davis struck out. Heppner started with Smith going out short to first. Anderson hit a hot grounder to Davis, who diverted the ball toward and Anderson made first. Van Marter forced him at second and Drake struck out. That ended the scoring until the last half of the ninth inning when, with one strike and one ball on him, Van made a two base hit and Le Mear hit the first ball out of the lot for a home run, thereby but six pitched figured in the scoring.

Ione had five men left on bases and Heppner four. It was a pitcher's battle from start to finish and but four hits were made by each team.

Ione had chances of success in the eighth when Fasnacht and Mauney knocked out singles, but Lundell forced Fasnacht at 2nd and Cochran struck out. Werner was hit by pitcher, filling the bases, but Drake hit a grounder to pitcher for an easy out.

Heppner got a man on first thru errors in the 3d, 4th and 8th but were never near scoring until the fatal 9th, and but 31 men faced each pitcher. Earned runs, Ione 1, Heppner 2; 3 base hit, Cochran; 2 base hit, Van Marter; home run, LeMear; Struck out by Drake, 10; by Davis 5. Bristow was the fielding star, having handled 11 chances and being charged with one error, but that was on a ball which he recovered after it had gone through Werner at third and a rush throw was too wide for the first baseman.

Ione has been up against a jinx all season, but thought it had been broken after having beaten Condon two straight and Condon is conceded to have the heaviest hitters in the League. Davis has struck out 65 men in 6 game and allowee dut two earned runs, yet has not had good support in the pinches and lost to Hermiston by 3 to 2, Arlington 3 to 2, Heppner, 2 to 1 and again to Heppner 2 to 1.

We have lost the services of the best pitcher ever shown in Morrow County, as Gold Hill of the Southern Oregon League offered him a contract for five months at \$50 a game and a good paying job besides, and we could not hold him. However he has secured Manning who pitched on the same team with him at Vernonia, last year, to fill his place. Manning did not lose a game for them last year. He pitched a shut out game at Oswego last Sunday. He arrived in Ione Wednesday and will show his stuff against Arlington on Ione grounds, Sunday. He has had much experience in Canadian and Montanan leagues and is highly praised by Davis.

TO ALL HOLDERS OF SECOND LIBERTY LOAN BONDS NOTICE OF REDEMPTION

All outstanding Second Liberty Loan 4 per cent bonds of 1927-42 (Second 4's) and all outstanding Second Liberty Loan Converted 4 1/2 per cent bonds of 1927-42 (Second 4 1/2's) are called for redemption, on November 15, 1927, pursuant to the terms of their issue. Interest on all Second 4's and Second 4 1/2's will cease on said redemption date, November 15, 1927.

Holders of Second 4's and Second 4 1/2's will be entitled to have the bonds redeemed and paid at par on November 15, 1927. Such holders may, however, in advance of November 15, 1927, be offered the privilege of exchanging all or part of their bonds for other interest-bearing obligations of the United States. Holders who desire to avail themselves of the exchange privilege, if and when announced, should request their bank or trust company to notify them when information regarding the exchange offering is received.

Further information may be obtained from any Federal Reserve Bank or branch, or from the Commissioner of the Public Debt, Treasury Department, Washington.
