## THE INCOME TAX

Having in mind that the state re-  
quired \$3,000,000 more than could  
be raised without a vote of the  
people, I suggested to the legisla-  
ture the income tax and the tithing  
bill, hoping that the income  
tax would produce about \$2,000,  
000 and the tithing bill something  
less than \$1,000,000. The income  
tax was passed. The tithing bill  
was defeated by the legislature.

Appropriations were made to-  
taling approximately \$4,000,000  
in excess of available state reve-  
nue. I vetoed bills providing for  
\$1,300,000, leaving a deficit of  
over \$2,000,000 for the current  
biennium.

## CROP OUTLOOK GOOD

Lexington Business  
Man Optimistic.

"If crop prospects hold out  
until harvest, Morrow county will  
have the greatest yield of wheat  
in her history" is the opinion ex-  
pressed to this paper Karl L. Beach,  
Lexington implement dealer, who  
was in the city a short time on  
Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Beach  
is basing his opinion upon a personal  
visitation to the wheat fields cov-  
ering the greater portion of the  
county, that he has made during the  
past week, and his survey of the  
situation has been quite complete.  
He has taken in all of the wheat  
belt with the exception of upper  
Eight Mile and the Hardman area,  
and his long experience, covering a  
period of about thirty years, spent  
in the Lexington wheat belt, would  
seem to qualify Mr. Beach as an  
expert witness when it comes to  
testimony touching the crop out-  
look.

Barring adverse weather con-  
ditions or some calamity, Morrow  
county should have the greatest  
crop in her history this season.  
We are justified in making this  
prediction from present conditions  
and the further fact that the ac-  
centage of both fall and spring  
sown grain is larger than for  
many years past.

## HEPPNER EDUCATOR APPOINTED MORROW COUNTY CHAIRMAN

Miss Pearson of High School  
Faculty Made Chairman of  
Greater Oregon Club

The appointment of Miss De-  
loris Pearson of the Heppner  
High School faculty, as Morrow  
county chairman of the Greater  
Oregon Club for the 1927 sum-  
mer sessions of the University of  
Oregon, has been announced on  
the campus.

Miss Pearson was graduated  
from the University of Oregon in  
1925 and was active and well  
known on the campus. She was  
strongly recommended for the  
position of leadership in the Great  
Oregon Club by Supt. James  
M. Burgess of the Heppnerschools.

The Morrow county group, of  
which Miss Pearson will be the  
chairman, is expected to be the  
largest this summer that ever at-  
tended a University of Oregon  
summer school. Under the leader-  
ship of President Arnold Ben-  
nett Hall, a wide range of courses  
and a faculty of national reputa-  
tion have been arranged, with  
the result that summer study  
has a particularly strong appeal  
this year to teachers, principals  
and superintendents who wish to  
avail themselves of the opportu-  
nity to study with such authori-  
ties as Dr. George D. Strayer of  
Columbia University, Supt. Jesse  
H. Newlon of Denver, Supt. Carle-  
ton Washburn of Winnetka, and  
Supt. H. B. Wilson of Berkeley.

The University is simultane-  
ously holding two sessions, from  
June 20 to July 29, one at Port-  
land and the other at Eugene.

## NOTICE TO WATER CONSUMERS

At a regular meeting of the Com-  
mon Council of the City of Ione, Ore-  
gon, held on the 2nd day of May,  
1927, the Council of said City set  
the following rates for water to consum-  
ers:

Minimum rate, first 2000 Gals., \$2.00  
Each 1000 gallons in excess of 2000  
gallons, 30 cents per 1000 gallons.

It was further ordered that con-  
sumers be informed, that under sec-  
tion 20, Ordinance No. 63, water  
rent is due and payable on the 1st  
day of each month, at the office of  
the City Marshal, and if payment is  
not made within ten days thereafter,  
the water shall be shut off from the  
premises until payment is made of  
the amount due together with a 50  
cent extra charge against consumer  
for turning water off and on.

## VACCINATION OR SMALLPOX

The smallpox record of 1926  
once again gives to the United  
States the undesirable distinction  
of having reported more cases of  
this preventable disease than any  
other country outside of Asia, ac-  
cording to a bulletin received to-  
day at the office of the Oregon  
Tuberculosis Association. The fig-  
ures were tabulated by the Amer-  
ican Association for Medical Pro-  
gress, New York City. A total of  
33,752 cases were reported in the  
United States last year.

The six states having the large-  
st number of cases were Indiana,  
Florida, California, Washington,  
Ohio and Texas. Oregon was 9th  
with 1557 cases reported. In con-  
trast with these figures were Ver-  
mont, 0, Rhode Island, 0, Dela-  
ware and New Hampshire, 1 each;  
Connecticut, 2, Massachusetts,  
4, Maryland, 5, New Jersey, 14,  
New York State with more than  
ten million population had only  
305 cases and no deaths.

Of the 316 deaths in the United  
States, 236 occurred in California  
and 31 in Washington. Oregon  
had 5 deaths from this cause.  
The statistician of the A. A. M. P.  
points out that there is a close  
correlation between the strength  
of the anti-vaccination movement  
and the number of deaths from  
smallpox.
