POULTRY YIELD INCREASED

Interesting and profitable results have been obtained by poultrymen in Oregon through the application of electricity. Erse of regulation, reduced fire hazard, simplicity of operation, reduced labor, less crowding in brooders and greater cleanliness are some of the Advantages claimed. The cost of power for lights and of extra feed consumed is relatively small compared with the increased returns:

A growth of 35,000 in membership during the last two years will be reported by Rev. Charles Emerson Burton, D. D., of New York city, general secretary of the National Council of the Congregational Churches in the United States, at the biennial meeting of the Council to be held in Omaha, Neb., May 25 to June 1, 1927.

The present total membership is 914,698. While the membership has increased the churches have decreased by 72, the number now being 5,608. This development of fewer but larger churches is said to be the result of two fundamental principles which characterize the denomination, - first devotion to an effective plan of evangelism, and second, determination to have no part in bringing about or continuing an "over churching" condition in any community.

Definite platforms for close affiliation with the Universalist churches and with the churches of the General Conference of Christian Churches, will be recommended by the Commission.

NOTICE TO WATER CONSUMERS

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Ione, Oregon, held on the 2nd day of May, 1927, the Council of said City set the following rates for water to consumers:

Minimum rate, first 2000 Gals., \$2.00
Each 1000 gallons in excess of 2000 gallons, 30 cents per 1000 gallons.

It was further ordered that consumers be informed, that under section 20, Ordinance No. 63, water rent is due and payable on the 1st day of each month, at the office of the City Marshal, and if payment is not made within ten days thereafter, the water shall be shut off from the premises until payment is made of the amount due together with a 50 cent extra charge against consumer for turning water off and on.
