"King Cole" Has Easy Time
With Arlington and Heppner.

Ione continued their winning streak by winning from Arlington, 9 to 1, last Sunday and taking Heppner's scalp, 9 to 4, on Monday.

Owing to the fact that the Semi-pro teams were fortunate in getting the service of King Cole, one of the leading twirlers of the City league. Cole pitched both the games, winning easily.

The Arlington game started off very much in Ione's favor. Six hits produced four hits in the first inning. Ione collected a total of 17 hits and 9 runs to Arlingtons seven hits and one run. An error by pitcher Cole in the eighth inning resulted in the Arlington score.

Ragged baseball with two hits in the first inning put two runs across for Heppner in the first inning. They didn't register again until the fifth when a walk two hits and an error gave them two more runs.

Ione put one across in the second and another in the third. In the fourth Bristow fanned, Davidson singled, and Lundell followed with a single. Thorne who hit for Howell put one out to short who fumbled it allowing all men to be safe. Arch Cochran led every ball players one ambition which is to knock a home run with the bases loaded. He caught Drakes first pitch squarely for a trip around the bases giving Ione a four run lead. Cole held Heppner safe while Ione shared across three more runs making the count 9 to 4.

Purely American Bird

Use Brush on Floors
