Giant Arctic Bear

The polar bear is a large bear
(Ursus or Thalarctos maritimus) in-
habiting the Arctic regions of both
the Old and the New world. It at-
tains a length of about 9 feet and of-
ten weighs more than 1,000 pounds.
It frequents the shores and ice floes
and swims well, living largely on
seals. It differs from other bears in
its creamy white color, long neck, nar-
row skull and small molar teeth.

FOREST FIRES AGAIN

The Federal statute which
makes leaving a camp fire or a
brush fire in or near a Federal
Forest without totrily extinguish-
ing it a criminal offense if National
Forest timberland is endan-
gered, has been upheld as con-
stitutional by the Supreme Court
of the United States. In handing
down the opinion of the Court,
Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes
said: "The purpose of the act is
to prevent forest fires which
have been one of the great eco-
nomic misfortunes of the coun-
try. The danger depends upon
the nearness of the fire; not upon
the ownership of the land where
it is built. Taken in connec-
tion with the danger to be pre-
vented, the statute lays down a
plain enough rule of conduct for
anyone who seeks to obey the
law.

Medieval Legend

According to the story of "The Pot
of Basil," Isabella was in love with

him. Isabella then planted his head
in a beautiful flower pot from which
grew a plant which Isabella tended
carefully. In Alexander's painting
Isabella is shown standing beside the
pot.

Shocking Affair

Ostriches may have no feathers
but they have bad tempers, so a de-
vice has been invented to conquer
these birds. It consists of a handle
six feet long, with a fork at the top
which carries a strip of brass. When
pushed against the neck of a charging
bird, an electrical contact is made and
the bird is given such a shock that
docility results.

Ship's Official Record

Logbook is the book in which the
master of a ship enters each day a
brief but exact account of all the
vents of that day, the miles made by
that day's run of the ship, an account
of the weather, and the names of ves-
sels sighted or spoken when names
can be obtained. The log is the of-
ficial record of the voyage.

Poisonous Upas Tree

Upas is the name given to various
species of trees found in Java and
other islands of the Eastern archi-
pelago. From these trees ooze a
poisonous gum, used by the natives
for tipping their arrows. The tales
of the deadly effect of this tree on
plants and animals in its vicinity are
largely fictitious.

Their work in the school included
a study of electricity and mag-
netism, mathematics, basic shop
work, storage battery and shaft-
ing sets, training methods, radio
laboratory, radio shop work, ra-
dio equipment, lettering, army or-
ganization, code practice, field
work, touch typing, fixed station
operation and message centers.

These young soldiers therefore
have received training that will
enable them to obtain and hold
responsible positions in civilian
life should they at some time elec-
t to leave the service. The training
has been given without cost to
them.

The majority of them, however
will no doubt desire to remain
with the colors and secure the
splendid assignments that fall to
to the lot of expert radio men.
Positions of responsibility, plus
interesting duties, call them to
Hawaii, the Philippines, China,
Alaska and to the Army Trans-
port Service, whose ships are con-
tinuously sailing the seven seas.

Diet and Cancer

The theory advanced by many per-
sons that eating a natural or wild diet
will prevent cancer has apparently
been contradicted by recent experi-
ments, reports Hygiene Magazine. When
mice, the type of animals especially
suited to cancer experiments, were
placed on various diets, those fed the
wild diet had the highest cancer mor-
tality and those fed an apparently an-
tineoplastic diet had the lowest. There
was not the slightest evidence that
fried or well-cooked food was asso-
ciated with an increase in cancer.
