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LIQUOR CASE SETTLED

In the cause of the State of Oregon vs. Roy Oleschlager, noted in our columns last week as continued to the 26th inst., settlement was reached Thursday, July 14, Lloyd Matteson, of Ritter, accompanied by District Attorney S. E. Notson, presented himself at the office of Judge Robinson and plead guilty to the charge filed against Oleschlager,—the possession of intoxicating liquor.

Judge Robinson assessed a fine of fifty dollars and costs of the court proceedings, \$5. The total of which fine and costs was immediately paid in cash.
