FUMIGATING THE HOME. AUTHORITIES NOW HOLD PRACTICE USELESS

Not so many years ago it was a legal requirement that all householders should have their rooms or houses thoroughly fumigated with some approved type of chemical, assuring gaseous penetration before the quarantine placard could be removed. A lot of physicians and health officers were skeptical about the results of this, but for a long time the majority opinion held that it was necessary for the safety of the public. Dr. Chas. V. Chapin, the courageous health officer of Providence, R. I., almost single handed, about 15 years ago, proved that most of it was fallacious and useless, and an unnecessary trouble and expense to everybody concerned.

Dr. Chapin made his experiments and proved his case, which is now recognized all over the country. There can be no estimate as to the vast amount of money, time and trouble that Dr. Chapin's experiments have saved the people of this country.

Today almost everywhere, the approved type of fumigation for the small home owner, following a case of communicable disease, is a thorough application of soap and hot water and plenty of sunshine and fresh air. Soap, properly used is a well known germ chaser.

FOREST SERVICE MAKING FLOOD SURVEY

An extensive survey which will be brought together all available information on the location and area of flood needed on the Mississippi watershed as a part of flood prevention and control has been started by the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, according to information just received by District Forester C. M. Granger from Col. William M. Greeley, Chief Forester.

This survey has been declared an emergency job by the Forest Service officials, and the entire personnel of the Service has been instructed to stand ready to lend a hand in speeding the big undertaking to completion. The survey will be completed by early fall.

The object of the survey, the chief forester states, is to bring out on this enormous drainage basin, the area or watersheds where on account of rainfall, character of soil, topography, etc., forest cover has an important protective value.

INTERESTING ITEMS FROM GRANE LODGE COMMUNICATION

Portland, Ore.—The 77th annual communication of the Grand Lodge of Oregon was reported to have been one of the most interesting and constructive held in many years. It is noted from the minutes that over three thousand dollars has been contributed thru the various lodges of the state to the Grand Lodge of Louisiana to aid the flood sufferers.

The Grand Master in his address recommended consideration which would encourage an applicant to the Masonic Home to be cared for in the locality in which he or she may be living and not be taken from the old ties of home, friends and acquaintances. The committee appointed to consider this recommendation reported favorably to the adoption of the policy.

Also at the Grand Master's recommendation a special committee was appointed and authorized to consider changes in the ceremonies of the ancient usages of the Order such as instituting and constituting a lodge, laying corner stones of public buildings and dedicating temples. The committee is to report at the next session of the Grand Lodge.
