## ELECTRICITY BRANDS WALNUTS

A marking machine driven by  
electricity is now being used to  
put brands on walnuts at the  
rate of 2,016 a minute.

A traveling belt carries the nuts  
between two cylinders, one of  
which is fitted with rubber brand-  
ing dies set in sponge rubber to  
prevent too much pressure. The  
walnuts are then conveyed by  
belts to the waiting sacks.

## SACCO AND VANZETTI

On April 15, 1920, a paymaster  
and his guard were robbed and  
murdered at a shoe factory in  
Braintree, Mass. Two Italians, Sac-  
co and Vanzetti were sus-  
picioned and arrested. A number of their  
statements made at the time  
of their arrest were afterwards  
proved to be false; other circum-  
stantial evidence pointed to them  
as the perpetrators of the  
crime. They were tried, found  
guilty and sentenced to die.

The time that has elapsed since  
then has been taken up by two  
motions for a new trial and by pro-  
ceedings in review leading to two  
decisions of the Supreme Court,  
which affirmed the procedure of  
the lower court. The date of the  
execution was July 10, 1927, but it has lately been  
deferred to August 10, 1927, by  
Governor Fuller of Massachusetts,  
who has placed the case in the  
hands of a committee for complete  
review of the facts to determine  
the justice of the decision.

### Famous Educator

William Holmes McGuffey was an  
American educator born in Washing-  
ton county, Pennsylvania, September  
23, 1800; died in Charlottesville, Va.,  
May 4, 1887. He was graduated at  
Washington college, Pennsylvania, in  
1823. He was professor of moral phi-  
losophy at Miami university, Wood-  
ward college, Cincinnati, and then until  
his death professor at the Univers-  
ity of Virginia.

### Deadly African Fly
