NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT

the undersigned will receive sealed bids until 2:00 o'clock P. M., the 7th day of September, 1927, and immediately thereafter the bids received will be publicly opened by the County Court, at the County Court Room in the Courthouse in Heppner, Oregon, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of Morrow County, for the construction of permanent roads therein in the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000), said bonds to be in denominations of \$1,000 each, numbered 1 to 120, inclusive, to bear date of September 1, 1927, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$6,000 on the first day of September in each of the years 1933 to 1932, inclusive, the first maturing \$78,000 per value of said bonds to bear interest at 4 3/4% per annum and the last maturing \$42,000 per value of said bonds to bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2% per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of March and September, principal and interest payable in gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer in Heppner, Oregon, or at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

All bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified check for \$5,000.00.

The court reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
