MORROW COUNTY GRAIN AND WOOL SHOW

SAMPLES MAY BE LEFT AT LOCAL ELEVATORS

Morrow County is harvesting one of the largest, if not the largest, crop in the history of the county. What effect this will have upon land values remains to be seen. However, we do know that the effect would be much greater if the other communities in the state were told of it. The best way to do this would be to support the wool and grain show to be held in Heppner during the Rodeo.

Arrangements have been made for each warehouse manager in the county to care for samples of grain left with them for the show. Any farmer having plump wheat that is true to type and free from mixture should leave a sack with the local warehouseman to whom he hauls his grain and instruct him to notify the County Agent. Anyone not having equipment for cleaning grain for show purposes can make arrangements with the County Agent to have this done. One bushel of wheat will be displayed and to get the best bushel, one sack should be sent to the County Agent. All wheat not taking the first or second premium at this show will be returned to the owner. Those taking a first or second prize will be sent to the Northwest Land Products Show at Portland where they will compete against wheat grown in other sections of the Northwest. Morrow County has the reputation of growing the best quality of wheat grown in Oregon. Any county that can grow good quality wheat in large amounts should advertise the fact. Now that we have the crop, let's advertise the fact by supporting the grain show.

EMBLEM OF MASONRY GIVEN PROTECTION

Washington, D. C. — The United Brotherhood of Carpenters sought to register as a trademark a representation of a partly open workman's rule overlapping a partly open carpenter's compass, placed upon the representation of a shield. This was opposed by the Grand Lodge of Masonry of the State of New York on the ground that it was similar to the symbol of Masonry that has been used for many years, also stating that the similarity of the two emblems might cause them to be mistaken for each other as one who was not a close observer might believe the products of this brotherhood to have been produced by the Masonic Fraternity. This contention was upheld by the Examiner on trademark interference.


There will be preaching service at the Christian church, Sunday evening at 8:00 o'clock. This will be the first service following the master's vacation. Help make it a good one by your presence.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS NUMBER OF CASES INCREASING IN OREGON

Eighty two cases of epidemic infantile paralysis were reported to the California State Board of Health during the first two weeks of July. A few cases have been reported in Oregon. Infantile paralysis is an acute generalized infection due to a filterable virus, occurring both in epidemics and sporadically. The infective nature of the disease has been conclusively shown. The virus attacks the nervous system and persists in the nasal secretion for a long time. The paralysis may precede three or four days by nausea, vomiting, and fever. However, a child may go to bed apparently well, and wake up in the morning with paralysis and slight fever. The great majority of cases are found in children under five. Cases among persons over twenty are comparatively rare.

For the benefit of the public the following regulations for the control of infantile paralysis are published: The patient should be isolated as completely as possible in clean, bare room, well screened to keep out insects. Visiting is not permitted, and only the necessary attendant should come in contact with the case. All discharges, including sputum, nasal secretions, urine and feces, should be thoroughly disinfected. Eating utensils should be boiled. Every thing that comes in contact with the patient should be sterilized. Towels, bed linen and other fabrics should be boiled or dipped in a strong germicidal solution.
