**HYMN IS HONORED BY
 U. G. I TABLET**

ALL unobserved in the midst
 of clamorous construction work,
 two men placed a splendidly de-
 signed memorial tablet on the
 south wall of the 15-story United
 Gas Improvement Company Build-
 ing at Broad and Arch streets,
 Philadelphia.

Thus, without ceremony, did a
 \$10,000,000 corporation recog-
 nize the enduring fame of the
 hymn, "He Leadeth Me," which
 was written by the late Rev. Dr.
 Joseph Gilmore on that spot in
 1832. The tablet also recites the
 fact that the first Baptist church
 ever stood on the present site of
 the company's building.

Joseph Henry Gilmore, Jr., son
 of the author of the hymn, a
 business man of Rochester, N.
 Y., visited Philadelphia to view
 the tablet after it was placed.

The tablet inscription reads:
 "He leadeth me, O blessing
 name!
 O words with heavenly comfort
 and light!
 Whate'er I do, where'er I be,
 Still 'tis God's hand that leadeth
 me."

"HE LEADETH ME"

Sung throughout the world
 was written by the
 Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Gilmore,
 a son of a governor of New
 Hampshire, in the home of
 Deacon Watson, immediately
 after preaching to the First
 Baptist Church, N. W. corner
 Broad and Arch streets, on the
 26th day of March, 1832. The
 Church and Deacon Watson's
 home stood on the ground upon
 which this building is erected.

 gon, for the purchase of an issue of
 bonds of Morrow County, for the con-
 struction of permanent roads there-
 in to the sum of one hundred twenty
 thousand dollars (\$120,000), said
 bonds to be in denominations of \$1-
 000 each, numbered 1 to 120, inclu-
 sive, to bear date of September 1,
 1927, and to mature serially to en-
 tire principal at the rate of \$5,000 on
 the first day of September in each of
 the years 1928 to 1932, inclusive, the
 first serials \$20,000 per value of

 \$20,000 per value of said bonds to
 bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2% per

RAILROADS NOT DEAD

OVER the highways of the Unit-
 ed States passes a mighty pro-
 cession of buses, trucks and pas-
 senger automobiles—22,000,000
 of them—carrying people and
 freight. It looks as if this mighty
 parade of transportation facilities
 ought to cut considerably into
 railroad revenue. But don't weep
 for the railroads yet. Reports of
 their slow death have been much
 exaggerated.

Tons of freight and tons of freight
 mileage increased last year 7 per
 cent over the previous year. Oper-
 ating revenues increased 4.2 per
 cent; operating expenses 2.8 per
 cent.

The net operating income of all
 American roads last year was \$1,
 276,000,000, which was 8 per cent
 more than in 1925 and 25 per cent
 more than in 1924.

Consumption of coal is less, the
 tons of revenue (freight greater
 and carmiles have shown an in-
 crease. The railroads are still very
 much alive.
