### CONTRACTS AIR MAIL

The Boeing Air Transportation Incorporated, has taken over all the air contracts and the federal government is out of the business as far as ownership of property and operation of lines is concerned. The Boeing Company proposes to develop the business along commercial lines and will, as rapidly as possible, prepare to carry passengers and light freight. When the mail was inaugurated it was done solely as a government experiment; later other mail routes were established as feeders and private companies used their planes under contract. The companies developed improvements, made some money and saved the government money.
