FAMOUS OLD BELL

Regains Voice After Forty Years Of Silence.

For forty years a famous old bell on the First Unitarian Church in Taunton, Mass., has hung silent because its voice was completely ruined in 1885 when it cracked. The 882-lb instrument, cast in 1809 by a man who learned his trade from Paul Revere, was left in the belfry all these years, however. Nobody knew what else to do with it till last fall. An electrical engineer saw a possibility of welding the old bell electrically. Early this year a crew of experts climbed the tower with an electric welder connected by a cable to a portable generating set on the ground, 56 feet below. They chipped out the cracks in the hard bell metal and quickly filled them with 16 pounds of phosphor bronze. On Sunday morning, Feb. 13, the old bell rang out once more. Its voice has been restored by electricity.
