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Tradition Bars Jews' Union With Gentiles

The American Jewish press says that the tradition against intermarriage among Jews is traced back to Abraham, who ordered his estate manager, Eliezer, to obtain a wife for Isaac from among his, Abraham's, own people, in Aramea. It should be added that this is only a tradition. It became a practice among Jews at the time they returned from the Babylonian exile in the Fifth century before the common era. Intermarriage, however, has taken place among Jews at all times. The reason why Jews have clung to the tradition of Abraham and the enactment of Ezra lies in the psychology of group consciousness, especially as this is welded by the religious ideal. The belief of the Jews that they are a people chosen by God to disseminate knowledge of Him and His moral and ethical will among the peoples of the world is also a great factor motivated by the desire to hold to its mission in the world and, probably, also by the fear lest intermarriage should weaken the force for carrying out its mission.

History in Song

In early times many stories of war and love were worked into songs by groups of people. Instead of being ascribed to a certain poet these tales in rhyme of true events were the work of many unknown authors. These poems were set to music, in which was reflected the feeling of the people. Each race had its singers and these songs were the primitive means of expressing passions, beliefs and ideas.

As time passed many of these songs were lost and only a few are now preserved, for not many of them were written, but were passed down from generation to generation orally. These narrative songs were numerous in the time of Charlemagne, who held this lingual history of the people in high esteem and had the songs collected in all the countries under his dominion. Unfortunately this collection has been lost.—Kansas City Star.

Ancient Weapons and Armor on Exhibition

Recent accessions of the Metropolitan Museum of Art range from a huge suit of armor to whimsically decorated and finely spun Swedish glassware.

In the armor department the last few months have been added to the collection swords, lances, pistols and mail. Among the swords is an example of a calendar blade, etched with the names of the saints of each day of the year and the months, separated by their zodiacal signs. It is said to have proved very useful to an officer of 1500, who, in moments of danger, wished to be able to select quickly the proper saint upon whom he might call.

There is also an Italian knightly sword of 1450-1475, with a tongue-shaped blade, blackened hilt and large disk-shaped pommel, one side of which shows Saint George and the other the letters "L. H. S."

The firearms include a very long barreled pistol of about 1600, a "Wheelock Dag" of the same date, an Eighteenth century pistol from Naples and a large wall gun of the Seventeenth century.

What is thought to be the second largest suit of armor in the world is also on exhibition. So big was the doughty warrior for whom it was made that no one around the museum could be found strong or big enough to wear it.

In Splendor, Venice

Surpassed All Cities

In Venice of the Sixteenth century luxury and splendor surpassed all bounds; never before at any time nor in any city were religious ceremonies, victories, the conclusion of peace, the births of foreigners, or the marriages of illustrious persons, celebrated with greater pomp and magnificence. Those in the occupations of cloth makers and drapers reaped huge fortunes, for on nearly every gala occasion miles of rich new fabric were used and victors to the city were rendered speechless by the matchless spectacle. There was a great rivalry among the nobles to see who could appear in the processions in the most expensive robe of gold and velvet, while the rich and the hangings from balcony and carpets spread for the feet of the lords here strove to make themselves seen among the profusion of flowers, the countless flashing candles and the play of color. When some magnificent occasion of this sort was not in progress Venice was not permitted to be dull for a moment—there was always some carnival of merry-makers on the streets and masquerades were so common they became a nuisance and met with decrees forbidding them.—Detroit News.

Scarlet Uniform Not Conspicuous in Field

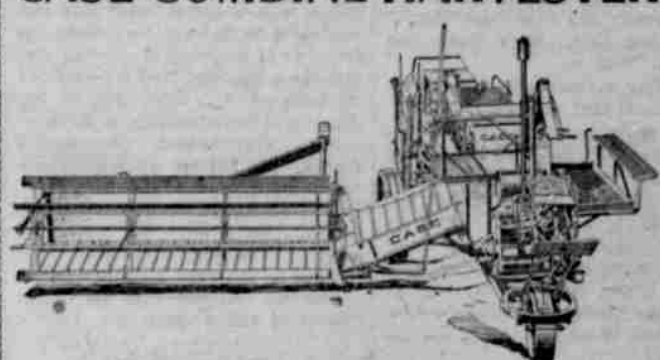
The writers of American school histories have frequently taken occasion to remark scornfully upon the scarlet uniforms worn by the British regulars in the campaigns against the Indians during Colonial days, but as a matter of fact, the scarlet coat of the Briton was a less conspicuous uniform than the blue subsequently adopted for the army of the United States.

Careful experiments have brought out the fact that light gray, such as that worn by the West Point cadets, is the color first lost to sight in the field. Scarlet comes next, with dark gray, blue and green in the order named. In target practice it has been found that of all colors scarlet is most difficult to hit. Light green is almost invisible under the violet tinge of electric lights, and would, therefore, be an excellent color for the uniforms of naval scouts who would be exposed to the rays of an enemy's searchlights.
