There was even a law in the ancient "Twelve Tubles" concerning the ownership of acorns, should they by chance fall upon another man's Scattered throughout the countries of the Old world are individual oaks, preserved and treasured through centuries because of some incident or ceremony that took place beneath their widespread branches.

The extraordinary strength of oak made this wood most serviceable to primitive man, and as civilization refined itself and found room for expressions of beauty, this same durability led woodcraftsmen to trust their finest Inspirations to the taun h liber of

in the Middle ages oaken shrines halls, churches and public editions matchless beauty were created which still stand in good preservation today, When the old London bridge was taken down in 1827, oak piles from the old foundation were found apparntly as sound as when first driven, over 600 years ago

Breakwaters in the Severn in Engand are still in use, whose oak plies were driven by the Romans. Ancient shipwrights found that elbowed branches, knotted and gnarled, made excellent ships' timbers, to protect brave men who "went down to the sea

n shtps." From the time when massive furniure and beams of oak graced the balls of medieval nobility, through seriods of more delicate design, to the resent day, dominated by the demand or utility, oak remains the wood you an trust and the wood by which all thers are judged.

"As strong as oak; as beautiful as sak; as enduring as onk"-such exressions are common. You never row tired of oak. Scars do not seem o mar oak as they do other fancier voods; as in man, they seem rather he marks of character.

Oliver Wendell Holmes, in his "Auocrat of the Breakfast Table," has his to say of the oak: "Take the ak-and we find it always standing s a type of strength and endurance. wonder if you ever thought of the ingle mark of supremacy which disinguishes this tree from all our other orest trees. All the rest of them hirk the work of resisting gravityhe oak alone defies it. It chooses the portzontal direction for its limbs, so hat their whole weight may tell, and hen stretches them out 50 or 60 feet. o that the strain may be mighty nough to be worth resisting."

Wireless Fog Warnings

Fog is one of the greatest dangers to shipping, but it is hoped that a new wireless invention may in future auto custically warn approaching vessels of their nearness before it is too late to avoid a collision,

This invention is in the form of as electric beam that will broadcast # warning signal over a ten-mile radius to other ships in its path. It is indesendent of the ordinary wireless and need only be turned on in foggy weather.

By locating the signals, other craft will be able to take the necessary steps through the use of the radio compass that shows the direction from which the signals are coming.
