A shower given Mary Frank at the home of her parents, Nov. 8, at 2 p. m. was attended by a number of mothers and daughters living in and about Ione.

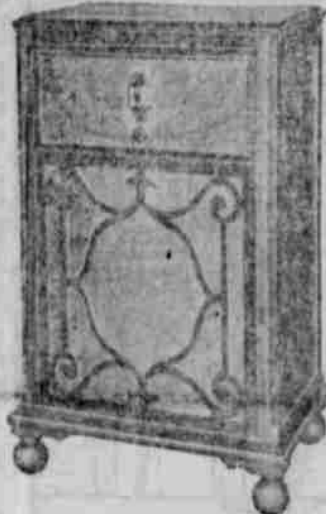
Mary received many useful gifts, among them a rolling pin which will be especially helpful in setting up housekeeping.

Mr. and Mrs. Orval Cutsforth of Lexington were calling at the Pat Medlock home, Sunday.

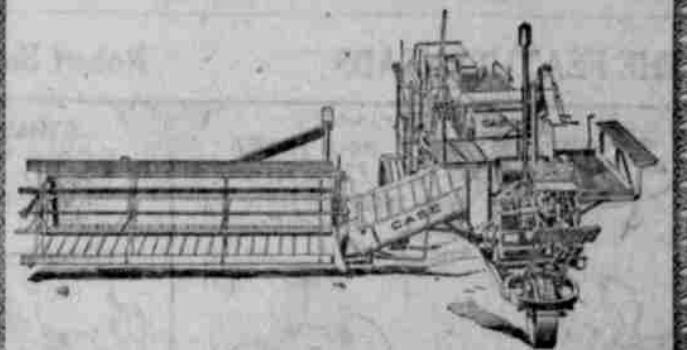
Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Pettyjohn were visiting Mr. and Mrs. Ekleberry, Sunday evening.
