WHEAT EXPORTS GAIN

Wheat exports through the
Port of Portland in October last
year were 4,897,136 bushels,
against 7,250,167 bushels in Octo-
ber this year, an increase of 2,
353,931 bushels representing a
gain 48 per cent, with an increase
in value from \$6,659,471 to \$9,
9,229,916. In comparison of Sep-
tember last year with September
this year, a gain of 64 per cent
is shown. The movement the last
two months, in addition to show-
ing large gains, has broken all
records for corresponding months
of the previous years. A total of
1,333,371 bushels of wheat with
a value of \$1,857,53 cleared
from Portland during the first
four days of November. Judging
from the present lineup of full
cargo vessels now in the harbor
with those due to arrive within
the next ten days, in addition to
the berth line space assigned, the
wheat exports for November
should exceed by at least a mil-
lion bushels the movement in
November 1926, when wheat ex-
ports amounted to 3,451,397 bush-
els.
