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

Police Dogs Quickly Showed Their Quality

The first city in the world to instal. dogs as regular members of the police force was the quaint old city of Ghent In Belgium. Years ago the chief of police of Ghent pointed out to the governing authorities that a cleverly trained dog could run down a crim inal more surely and quickly than any two-legged policeman, and that it was better to risk a dog's life rather than that of an officer. The idea found favor and the chief was commissioned to get his dogs. This he did and trained them to distinguish between skulking criminals and the ordinary reputable citizen, who walks by day Special kennels were built in the police stations, and collars, coats and muzzles were provided in the way of unl forms. The dogs proved particularly useful to the police at night and saved much running backwards and forwards. These dogs are so highly intelligent that they refuse food from strangers, bring home lost children. Many of them are so anxious to get a "case" that they will follow and look askance at a person of suspicious appearance. Long-Buried Treasure Still Lures Seekers

Pacioma canyon, in the mountains hast of San Fernando mission in California, contains, according to tradition, a great chest of gold beaten into the form of plates and platters for altar and dining service. Some estlmates place the value of the treasure at \$1,000,000. Paciona canyon is wild and ragged but men have time and again tried to find the treasure. Aided by a map on a tanned sheepskin, sketched with a hot metal point by a San Fernando padre himseif, the seekers have been unable to find the chest. If tradition is true history, the chest contains the largest assortment of gold plates and platters ever heaten into form by Indian smiths of any of the missions in the Californias, either below or above the Mexican boundary line. Rojerio Rocha, gold and silver sulti at the San Fernando mission. not only helped beat the plates and platters, but he was one of the trusted party that hid the golden utensils when word came that United States soldiers were marching down the San Fernando valley. A few weeks before Rocha died he took from his old wooden chest a place of tanned theop--kin, bearing traces of a hot metal

Tools in Salt Mines Three great caves in a mountain of selt in Nevada have yielded relics of Indian miners who worked there as early as 1000 B. C. 


