T. B. DEATH RATE LOWERED

The greatest single health
achievement in 1927 was the re-
duction in the death rate for tu-
berculosis to a new minimum for
all time, according to Dr. Louis
I. Dublin, statistician of the Met-
ropolitan Life Insurance Com-
pany. This new minimum of 93.5
per hundred thousand was regis-
tered among the more than eight
teen millions of industrial policy
holders of the Metropolitan. It is
4.8 per cent below the previous
minimum of 98.2 established in
1925.

While no figures are yet avail-
able for tuberculosis among the
general population last year, the
indications are that a new mini-
mum also will be registered in the
country at large, since conditions
among the company's industrial
policy holders usually reflect
health conditions throughout the
country.

Since 1920, when a death rate
from tuberculosis of 137.9 pe-
r 100,000 was recorded, the reduc-
tion has been 32.2 per cent, ac-
cording to Dr. Dublin; since 1915
it has been 52.7 per cent; and
since 1911, when the rate was
224.6, there has been a remark-
able drop of 58.4 per cent. The
death rate from tuberculosis of
the respiratory system, which
causes almost nine tenths of all
deaths due to tubercular dis-
eases, dropped 59.3 per cent since
1911.

GRAND LODGE VOTES \$10,000 FORMEMORIAL

At the 150th annual session of
the Grand Lodge of Virginia it
was voted to erect the bronze
doors of the George Washington
Masonic National Memorial at
Alexandria, and \$10,000 was ap-
propriated for that purpose. It
was reported by a committee of
the Memorial Association that it
was planned to spend \$500,000
this year on construction of the
temple, bringing the outlay to ap-
proximately \$3,000,000. An en-
dowment fund of \$1,500,000 will
be created, this to bring the to-
tal cost of the temple project to
approximately \$4,500,000. It is
also stated that \$2,000,000 more
will be required to complete the
construction and provide the en-
dowment fund, and this is ex-
pected to be contributed by Ma-
sonic lodges and individuals
throughout the country.

Tapping Maple Trees
Tapping only one place on a tree
