Oregon State College Military Tournament

Ione Student Has Part In Day's Program

Oregon State College,
Corvallis, Ore., May 31.

Nolan Page, of Ione, is to take part in the 16th annual military tournament here, Saturday, June 2, in which more than 1200 Oregon State R. O. T. C. cadets will participate. Laying the cornerstone of the new \$500,000 Memorial union building will share honors with the tournament on this day as main attractions. Capt. H. Lester Barrett is tournament director this year.

Its influence is felt throughout more than 10,000 workshops and among more than 10,000,000 workers, whose lives are safer because of its service. Its scope has grown from national to international.
