On the Watch!

A bank in Portland, Maine, has applied the well known principles of the periscope for the protection of its underground vaults. A long tube has been built into the outer wall of the building, one end of it terminating in a mirror facing the door of a big safe down in the vault, and the other in a similar mirror at shoulder level above the street. A policeman or other guard, patrolling the sidewalk in front of the bank, peers occasionally through a secret peephole in the side of the building, so that he can observe the whole scene in the cellar vault, explains Science and Invention Magazine. Electric lamps and reflectors illuminate the vault so that the policeman above can see everything clearly. Any obstruction placed in front of the mirror in the cellar immediately betrays the presence of intruders.
