## INTERNATIONAL ANTI-CRIME CONFERENCE CALL OUT FOR MEET AT BOISE IDAHO

The eighth International Anti Crime Conference will be held at Boise, Idaho, August 16-18. S. E. Notson, District Attorney, Heppner, Oregon, who is State Vice-President of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police, is sending out special invitations to the sheriffs, district attorneys and other law enforcement officials to attend this conference. All governors, sheriffs, circuit judges, district attorneys mayors and police officers are entitled to membership in the conference.

The Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police is doing a constructive work in combating crime by means of these anti crime conferences. Criminals are organized to an alarming extent. Hence the law enforcement officials must organize and co operate to a greater extent. The Northwest Association is becoming the clearing house for state, provincial and local organization of seven states, three British provinces and Alaska.

Eminent jurists expert crimi-

nologists and others experienced in dealing with law breakers will appear upon the Boise program. The citizens of Boise are making preparations to entertain the delegates royally.

## IDAHO-OREGON TURKEY GROWERS ASSOCIATION

ORGANIZED AT BOISE BY 14 FARM WOMEN NOW HAS 1800 MEMBERS

In 1923 a group of farm women, 14 in number, who were dissatisfied with the prices they were receiving, effected the organization that has since grown into the Idaho-Oregon Turkey Growers Association with a membership of 1800 and shipping in the last market season 70 cars of dressed turkeys netting the growers a quarter of a million dollars cash in hand at the time of delivery at the car side.

The growth in membership and territory served has been steady. In the second year the membership increased to 400 and the territory now served includes southern and central Idaho and the eastern counties of Oregon.

The overhead of the Association is covered by an annual membership fee of one dollar and the payment to the association of a half a cent a pound by the buyer. The grower delivers his turkeys to the car side at the designated point of assembly, sees them weighed and graded and receives a check for the full amount of the purchase price. There is no waiting for returns on the final disposition of the birds in a distant market. When the grower
