PAPER MULCH

Potatoes grown under a paper mulch last year at one of the U. experiment plots came into flowering from 5 days to 2 weeks earlier than those grown without the paper mulch. The average weight of the mulched plants was 386 grammes, while that of the unmnlched plants was only 81. This increased growth of the potato plants under the paper mulch was typical of the response obtainde with various other truck crops. While the practical use of such a mulch is closely associatad with climatic, crop, market and labor conditions, its possible adoption as a means of hastening the maturity of crops is of interest to growers anxious for early markets.
