[Special] — Saving and loan leaders from ten western states and the province of British Columbia will gather here August 8 to 11 to discuss mutual business problems. Senator William E. NEW OREGON ROAD MAP

A new edition of the popular Oregon road and information map folder has just been received at the office of the district forester, Portland, Oregon.

Copies of the map may be obtained from the district office library, New Post Office Building, Portland, Oregon, or from any of the fourteen forest supervisors in the State. The forest service makes no charge for the map, simply requesting cooperation from the map users in educating the public to leave a clean camp and a dead fire.

PAPER MULCH

Potatoes grown under a paper mulch last year at one of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's experiment plots came into flowering from 5 days to 2 weeks earlier than those grown without the paper mulch. The average weight of the mulched plants was 386 grammes, while that of the unmulched plants was only 81. This increased growth of the potato plants under the paper mulch was typical of the response obtained with various other truck crops. While the practical use of such a mulch is closely associated with climatic, crop, market and labor conditions, its possible adoption as a means of hastening the maturity of crops is of interest to growers anxious for early markets.
