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GREAT STATE INDUSTRY

One of our basic home industries is the canning industry. In Oregon there are thirty-six plants packing canned fruits and vegetables. These plants operate on the average of five months during the year. The operations commence in May and extend at intervals through until December, save the Oregon Manufacturers Association. There is invested in buildings and real estate a total in excess of \$5,500,000.00. At the peak of the season, which ordinarily comes during pear packing time there are employed in these plants 7500 people, exclusive of the harvesting crews which number many thousands.
