## BUILDING PROGRAM AT U. of O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 7 [special]

Representing the largest summer building program of this type in the history of the University of Oregon, new quarters for 456 students are under construction at the Eugene institution and a total of approximately \$650,000 is being spent. A new dormitory, four new fraternity residences, and an extensive remodeling program for a fifth fraternity make up this notable building campaign.

All of the work is being rushed and three of the new houses will be ready for occupancy when the students return to the university, late in September. The new dormitory, which is being financed through bonds issued under the enabling act passed at the last session of the legislature, costing the people of the state is being rapidly completed and 275 men will find homes there at the opening of school.

## City Hall Briefs

The city council met in regular session and the roll call showed all members present. Routine matters were disposed of and the following list of claims audited and ordered paid: Tum a Lum Lumber Co., \$7.70; Bert Mason, \$3.47; Bristow & Johnson \$9.75; Ione Independent, \$7.50; Neptune Meter Co., \$65.82; The Independent Garage, \$7.50.

Bert Mason asked that a light be placed at the rear of his store building as a protection against prowlers, maintenance to be at Mr. Mason's expense. Councilman Lyon suggested that a light be placed at the corner of the ball park to make it a less desirable nocturnal loafing place. Both lights were ordered placed.

The matter of sidewalks was brought up and the street committee was instructed to see that those who had not built sidewalks as previously ordered be required to do so now.

Ralph Harris presented a petition of sundry property owners for permission to lay at their own expense an eight inch sewer for the drainage of certain properties between Main and Second streets and asking that in the event the petition was granted that the city act as receiving, disbursing and purchasing agent for the petitioners in this matter.

A delegation of fourteen citizens presented an oral petition asking for the better enforcement of order on the streets and in places of public assembly, citing various and frequent infractions of law and order and praying for relief. After general discussion, participated in by the petitioners, members of the council, the marshal and the recorder, the mayor referred the matter to the law and order committee with instructions to select 4 able, fearless and incorruptible citizens who might be appointed special deputy marshals to assist in the preservation of the peace, order and dignity of the city of Ione and the citizens thereof. This action taken, the council adjourned.
