VOTERS MUST REGISTER

The question of registration of voters is again arousing interest. I have been asked why a voter cannot be sworn in on election day. The answer is this: At the special election held on the 28th day of June, 1927, the people amended the state constitution so as to provide that a voter must be registered before election day or he cannot vote. Hence before the books close, a voter must register if not already registered.

The registration books are now open. They will close on the 6th day of October. If a voter has been registered but has not voted for two years last past, he must reregister. If a voter has changed his residence to another precinct from the one in which he is registered, he must have his registration changed. A person who will become of age between Oct. 6th and Nov. 6th, may register before the books close. If you are not sure you are registered, better find out from the county clerk. Everybody who is a qualified voter should vote. Hence every qualified voter should be registered not later than October 6th. Do not put it off. Attend to this at once and you will not be complaining on election day that you are shut out. You will want to vote this year hence make sure you are registered.

The State Library at Salem is highly recommended in a report on American library methods made by British investigators in 1927, and now published by the Carnegie United Kingdom Trust in Edinburgh, Scotland. The report which is widely circulated in England and America says of the Library: The Oregon State Library is extremely interesting and has unique features: the librarian is not afraid of experiment. The library's activities comprise four main services, viz. a mail order lending library for communities without library provision; a branch system of trav-

elling libraries in rural communities; a supplementary service to all public libraries and county libraries in the state; the selection and purchase of books for the school libraries of the state.

During the past biennium, the mail order department received nearly 34,000 requests from individual borrowers, and supplied over 125,000 volumes. The fact that the borrowers are willing to pay postage both ways speaks for the value of the service to them. The traveling library department sent out nearly 79,000 volumes to 700 communities without libraries, and augmented the stock of 69 public libraries. 2321 school districts were served by book loans, book lists and by the buying and delivery of school library books.

A notable feature of the service is its publicity work: the bulletins and book lists of important public libraries are procured in bulk and issued to centers and individual students. I noted also a bold and original method of supplying information by sending out sections of large and expensive reference works and encyclopedias. The section of a work is forwarded in an appropriately endorsed envelope. The scheme appears to work very well and enables students and others far from libraries to have a reference service more equal to that enjoyed by the dweller in a city. The state librarian in spite of her many activities gives very individual and personal supervision to the fulfillment of requests which are in a large measure for a book "about" a subject.

A strong personal interest combined with expert knowledge, gives a very valuable service to those who are far removed from the amenities available in cities and Oregon is fortunate in possessing a service of outstanding merit.
