STATE BONDED DEBT TOTAL NOW \$64,163,960.

According to a statement just issued by Sam Kozze, Secretary of State, the outstanding bonds of Oregon at this time aggregate \$64,163,960. Of this sum \$32,550,000 are State Highway Bonds; \$28,000,000 World War Veterans State Aid Bonds; \$2,158,960 are Irrigation District Bonds and \$450,000 are Rural Credit Bonds. By January 1, 1929, the total will be reduced to \$62,826,499 through the payment of \$857,000 of Highway and \$500,000 World War Veterans State Aid Bonds.

To meet the payment Highway Bonds as they fall due from year to year are the annual revenues from motor vehicle licenses and tax on gasoline. The payment of the World War Veterans State Aid Bonds is met annually from the repayment of the principal of the loans made to the veterans of the World War and the Spanish American War, which loans are secured by first mortgages on real property aggregating \$26,000,000 in value, and from the annual levy of one half mill on the taxable property of the state. Within a few years the returns from principal and interest payments on the loans to the ex service men should be sufficient to retire the bonds issued for the making of such loans and the payment of authorized bonuses to such persons and thus reduce the total annual state property tax levy by at least \$560,000.

The Rural Credit Bonds are also secured by first mortgages on real estate. These bonds were sold for the purpose of granting long time loans at low interest rates to aid agriculture. The Irrigation District Bonds are general obligations of the state. Certificates of indebtedness have been issued irrigation districts aided by this issue, but such certificates are not considered of great value, and in its finality it is quite possible that the state will be required to meet the greater portion of this liability.
