To Lie payment Highway Bonds as they fall due from year to rearare the an ual revenues from motor vehicle licrses and tax on gasoline. The payment of the World War Veterans State Aid Bouds is met annually from the repayment of the principal of th. loans made to the veteans of the World War and the Spanish American War, which loans are secured by first mortgages on real property agregating \$26, 000,000 in value, and from the annual levy of one half mill on the taxable property of the state. Within a lew years the returns from principal and interest payments on the irans to the ex serv ice men shoul be sufficient to re tire the bonds issued for the mak ing of such ioans and the payment of athorized bonuses to such persons and thus reduce the total annusi state property tax levy by at least \$560,000.

The Rural Credit Bonds are al so secured by first mortgages on real ertate. These bonus were old for the purpose of granting long time loans at low interest cates to aid agriculture. The Irri gation District Bonds are general obligations of the state. Certificates of indebtedness have been issued irrigation districus aided by theis issue, but such cert fi cates are not considered of great value, and in its finality it is quite possible that the state will be required to meet the greater portion of this liebility.




