The regular meeting of the Common Council of the town of Ione was held Tuesday, Oct. 2. The roll call showed as present: the Mayor and Councilmen Lundell, Bryson, Ritchie, McCabe and Bristow; absent: Linn.

The minutes were read and approved and the following list of claims approved by the committee on finance and by motion duly made, seconded and carried.

Ralph Harris, in the matter of proposed sewer, in accordance with the understanding reached at the last meeting of the Council laid on the table a check in the amount of \$500.00 and designated for the purchase of vitrified sewer pipe, and when making the tender, that when the pipe was delivered, he would proceed with the construction of the sewer.

The street committee being called for a report concerning sidewalk construction proposed at the last meeting of the council reported no progress.

A proposition to join with the Pacific Power and Light Co. in the rental of office room in the bank building on a 59-50 basis was submitted by the town marshal and rejected by the Council.

A question as to the advisability of attempting the control of radio interference by ordinance arising, general discussion followed but no action was taken, the consensus of opinion being that it would be better to rely upon voluntary co-operation for the elimination of local interference. Council adjourned.
