Our national observance of Thanksgiving is an inheritance from the Pilgrim Fathers, who assembled at the turn of the year to offer prayer and praise to Almighty God from whom come their strength to endure daily hardship and to face unknown danger. It is fitting that we should reverently continue in this day of prosperity and security the institution they founded amidst adversity and peril.

Now therefore in conformity with the proclamation of the president of the United States which comes as a recurring reminder of our nationality in the perpetuation of this American custom, I, I. L. Patterson, do proclaim Thursday, November 29, 1928 as Thanksgiving Day, and do hereby set it aside as a public holiday.
