BY OREGON HARBORS

Washington, D. C .- A total of \$1, 269,400, including \$600,500 for improve ment and \$668,900 for maintenance. will be allotted to rivers and harbors handling Oregon commerce from the \$50,000,000 river and harbor item in cluded in the war department bill reported to the house. Those figures include \$240,500 for improvement and \$62,500 for maintenance of the harbor at Crescent City, Cal., which will provide an important water outlet for southwestern Oregon.

The Oregon allotments approved by the chief of engineers include \$355,000 for improvement of the Umpqua river and \$5000 for improvement of Tills. mook bay and harbor.

The war department bill also will make available \$490,000 for additional construction at Fort Lewis, Wash., bringing the total amount appropriated and authorized for the building program there to \$2,242,000.


