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Mrs. Alice Keller Passes On

For Thirty-three Years a Resident Of Ione.

Mrs. Alice Keller whose death occurred at her home in Ione, the night of Wednesday, Jan. 30, was born in St Gall, Switzerland, Aug. 6th, 1846. She was the daughter of Arnold Riemann, who emigrated to the United States, while Alice was still an infant, settling in Illinois near the town of Highland which is thirty miles east of St Louis.

On the 30th day of May, 1865, she was married to Edward Keller, a teacher of languages in St. Louis, Mo. Subsequent to their marriage they removed to Marine, Ill., where they made their home until the death of the husband, August 6th, 1872. To this union were born three children, Alice, Edward Emanuel and Edward. Of these, the last named

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only survives; Alice, the eldest, dying in 1873 and Edward Emanuel in 1871.

For a number of years after the death of her husband, Mrs. Keller was a seamstress and teacher of sewing in a girls' orphanage at Webster Grove, now a suburb of St. Louis.

Following this she lived for a time in Highland, where she continued to work as a seamstress and dressmaker.

Subsequent to the time spent in Highland she was for three years, matron of the Blind Girls' home in St. Louis. Terminating her connection with the Home, she kept a rooming house in St. Louis, for five years, when she again moved to Highland, where she kept house for her son Edward while he was learning the blacksmith trade.

In December, 1895, Mrs. Keller and her son arrived in Ione and the following spring she built a
