### REFUND TO MAIL CARRIERS

Salem, Feb. 27. — "seems to me the United States government should give adequate compensation to mail carriers," Representative Jos. N. Scott, Pendleton, said in opposing S. B. 69, which was passed by both houses. The bill proposes a refunding of the tax on gasoline to rural free delivery carriers.

"The government is in better financial condition to pay this than the State of Oregon is," Scott declared.

Representative Herbert Egbert, The Dalles, supported the bill, saying, "In winter when the roads are so bad in some sections they cannot operate at four cents a mile aloted them by the government.

Other supporters urged that mail carriers are very poorly paid and should have this refund. The bill was passed by a large majority.

Saturday to Be Last Day; Stormy Time Expected on Final Closing Days.

Will Receive No Pay For This Week—Salary Increases Voted—Prohibition Bill Back in Committee—Truck and Stage License Considered

Salem, Or. — The 35th legislative assembly will adjourn sine die next week—probably midnight Saturday, March 2. Pay of the members has stopped, but the lawmakers will have to carry on until they dispose of the legislation still in committees. A few threaten to walk out, but there will be a working majority.

Commencing with breakfast Saturday morning, the members of the two houses began to eat out of their own pockets.
