# A PHANTASY

WHAT tremendous forces are at work today adding to the sum of human happiness, comfort and achievement! Of these, none is more vital than electricity. Yet so accustomed have we become to unailing service that it is taken for granted.

Suppose, however, that this service should suddenly cease. What would happen?

First darkness—a total absence of all artificial light except gas and that cast by automobile lamps.

Next, silence—transportation crippled; telephone bells silenced, fires unheeded because of the failure of fire alarm systems; hospitals thrown into confusion.

Industry at a standstill—the doors of banks and stores, shops and theaters locked; newspaper presses idle; elevators left suspended somewhere between sky and earth; the radio stilled.

It is a picture which, fortunately, is only a phantasy. The electric light and power companies of this country have seen to it that such a catastrophe can not occur. Through interconnections of their systems, continuous, dependable service is assured.

For service rendered, electricity is the smallest item in the family budget. Twenty-eight dollars and thirty cents a year, or eight cents a day is the average amount spent by the American family for electrical service.

pocketbooks, for the general compensation bill allowed each for the session is \$3 a day and not more. They will be compelled to dig up their own meal money for the next long week for the business yet unfinished cannot be cleared away in good order in any shorter time.

## Committee Behind.

This session is practically a full week behind the ordinary schedule of prior sessions so far as the money bills are concerned. Heretofore appropriation bills have commenced to make their appearance days before the theoretical 40-day limit had expired.

This time not a single one of the general appropriations have come down to the house from the upper story where the joint ways and means committee has been grinding night after night. One reason for this is, in all probability, due to the fact that the veteran chairman of the past few sessions has not been at the helm, the illness of Senator Staples slowing down the speed of the committee.

In the senate is the long list of taxation bills, not counting the income tax, and only one has been passed, this being centralization of control of assessments. The bill for a full-time tax commission, the excise tax, the intangibles tax and the various other measures in this group are to be reported out Monday or Tuesday, according to Senator Corbet, in whose committee they rest.
