Statistics are like knives; they can be used for good or evil, observes Dr. Thurman B. Rice in Hygela. The commonest a tence heard in debates usually 1 gins: "Statistics prove I'm Doctor Rice warns that statistics prove nothing except when they have been accurately collected. compiled interpreted and applied.

In the hands of some devotee of a faddish project a given set of figures may prove or disprove anything one hears a speaker quote fig ures from memory or without giving the source of his information it is time to go home, says Doctor Rice. It is easy to forget whether a certain death rate was 14 per thousand or 14 per hundred thousand,

The unscientific man uses figures to prove what he started out to prove, while the scientist uses them to lead him to the truth,

Big Bertha

"Rig Bertha" had a firing distance of 75 miles. The principle on which this long-distance gun was operated is that if a shell is fired upward at an angle of 55 degrees to the horizontal, and at a high velocity, so that the shell will rise above the dense at mosphere close to the earth's surface and rapidly reach the thin air which exists at a height of ten miles above the earth, then its flight will be practically unimpeded and it will travel a great distance before it falls again tha" the German shell rose to a height of 24 miles, and traveled more than 50 miles of its course in a very thin

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
