IONE EVENS COUNT DEFEATS ARLINGTON

Last Sunday's baseball game between Ione and Arlington, on the Ione grounds was played in a raging sand storm, with Arlington, making four scores through errors while Ione made three earned runs and two more on errors.

The catchers were obliged to face the shifting sand which it impossible for them to do good backstopping. Arlington made one hit in each the first, third and fourth innings. The sixth began with errors on the first two batters and another error on the fourth batter which allowed the visitors two runs without a hit. An error, a sacrifice, a walk and another error, followed by a two base hit, gave them two more in the seventh.

Ione went into the fifth inning before a hit was made, when Frank Lundell connected for a single. Ione started the fireworks in the seventh when Ritchie singled, Rietmann followed with a double, then came a hit by Ford who tried to stretch it into a double but was thrown out. Wallace, and Frank Lundell came through with hits and three scores crossed. Davidson's single, Rietmann reached first on an error, and hits by Ford and Wallace scored two more in the 8th. Two strikeouts and a roller to Rietmann finished the ninth.
