Harrison of Portland, state superintendent, to the Congrega tional Conference of Oregon at its eighty first annual meeting, held May 7 to 9, at Forest Grove. A total of 785 members were receiv ed into the churches by confess ion of faith or by letters of trans

fer and 588 were removed from church rolls because of a change of residence or death. The pres ent total membership of the chures is 7,879.

Total contributions received by the churches last year were \$157, 222 of which \$18,505 were for mis overslept and were not, ready sions and other benevolences and \$139,627 were for local expenses.

The total value of church prop erty is \$1,116 400.
