Astronomical Term

A "light year" is the term employed in astronomy to indicate the distance a ray of light traveling 186,000 miles a second can traverse in a year. Thus one can easily compute the distance of the present outermost visible limits of space which are estimated to be 100,000,000 light years away from the earth.—Exchange.

ELM BEETLES

The elm beetle is again at work on the elm trees in Ione and unless arrested will destroy them.

The mature beetles spend the winter under rubbish heaps and are now laying eggs. These eggs hatch in seven to ten days. The larva feed on the under side of the leaves for 15 to 20 days; in a few more days develop into beetle and deposit eggs. Complete defoliation of trees in July and August if control measures are not followed. Spray with arsenate of lead 3 to 5 pounds to 50 gal water, before the eggs hatch. A county is available at a few days notice.

Neglect for two or three years will cause trees to die.

ARTHUR PETTEYS DIES

Arthur Petteys, aged 21 years, died Sunday, June 2, in a hospital in Walla Walla, Wash. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon. Arthur was born at Ione and is the son of Albert Petteys of this place and Mrs. Mary Piefer of Walla. Besides his father and mother he leaves to mourn his loss, a brother, Gilbert, many other relatives and many friends.

About four weeks ago Arthur was taken ill here at the home of his aunt, Mrs. Chas Nord. His mother moved him to Walla Walla where he underwent a major operation. He was given the best of care but they could not save him. When his physician thought a blood transfusion necessary, his father went at once to the hospital and gave a pint and a half of his blood.

His father spent the last night with him and his mother was at his side before the end came at 5:15 o'clock, Sunday morning.

Many relatives from here drove to Walla Walla, Tuesday to attend the funeral services.

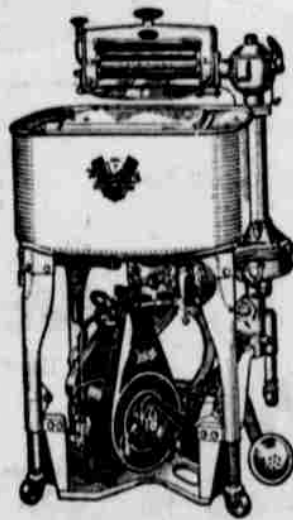
