NOTICE OF BOND SALE. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the undersigned will receive sealed bids until 10:00 o'clock A. M. the 7th day of August, 1929, and immediately thereafter the bids received will be publicly opened by the County Court, at the Courthouse in Heppner, Oregon, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of Morrow County for the construction of permanent roads therein in the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000). said bonds to be in denominations of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each, numbered 1 to 60 inclusive, to bear date of August 1, 1929, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) on the first day of August of each of the years 1930 to 1934 inclusive, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of February and August, principal and interest payable in United States gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer in Heppner, Oregon, or at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

Pomona Grange Notes

Morrow County Pomona Grange met as guests of Rhea Creek Grange on Saturday, July 6, with about 250 members and children present.

The morning session was given over to State Deputy Organizer, Bro. W. R. Geckeler, who made an interesting talk, urging that plans be started at once in preparation for a special meeting of the State Grange to be held in La Grande in October. Mr. Geckeler also spoke of the extension work in granges as planned by the State Grange. The result of this address was the assignment of different drill plans to the various subordinate granges for the October meeting and the appointment of a committee on extension work.

In the afternoon an excellent program was presented by the lecturer consisting of special musical numbers, flag drill, oration, reading and a pantomime besides a talk on patriotism by Rev. W. W. Head, and an address by W. L. Teutsch of O. S. C.

Mr. Teutsch spoke on "The Grange and Community Program of Development" and cited cases in which granges in other counties cooperate with the community in making practical use of their demonstrations.

To Morrow County Farmers: Dear Sirs:

In co operation with the state veterinarian's office, arrangements have been made to have the cows of Morrow County tested for tuberculosis. The veterinarian will be here some time next week and it is important if you desire this service to notify my office at once, if you have not already done so, so that routes may be established through the county and the time of the veterinarian arranged. This service is free to the farmers of the county and should be taken into consideration as bovine tuberculosis may be contracted by humans.

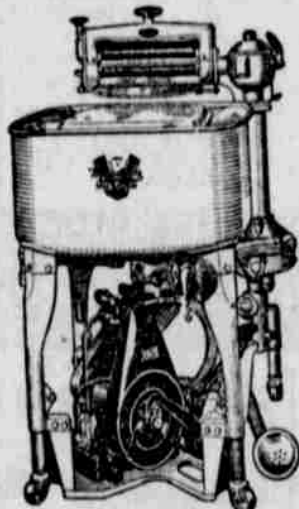
