A large crowd assembled for business session in the morning, at which time reports of the subordinate granges of both counties were read, nearly all showing growth. Two subordinates report building new grange homes to start in the early winter months. Many helpful suggestions were offered by Worthy State Master George A. Palmiter.

By vote of the order, Morrow County District Pomona name was changed to Morrow County Pomona.

About 300 guests were served during the noon hour to a sumptuous caetera dinner, besides the down town lunch rooms being filled.
