The regular meeting of the City Council was held Tuesday evening. There were present the Mayor, Marshal, Recorder and Councilmen Bryson, Linn, Balsiger and Davidson; absent, Lon d. H. and McCabe.

Bills of Mason, \$2.11 and of Balsiger for \$0.94 were submitted by the Recorder and ordered paid. The matter of the Budget was presented by the Recorder and referred to the Finance Committee. The Mayor named as Budget Committee, Messrs. Bullard, McCabe and Bristow.
