NOTICE OF SCHOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 35, of Morrow County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at Ione school house on the 25th day of November, 1929, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 30, 1929, and ending June 30, 1930, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax and all other moneys of the district.

When the budget meeting is held in connection with the annual school meeting, the following provision of section 232, School laws 1929, should be observed: "Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon any matters before the meeting."

T. U. Worker Dies Suddenly.

Mrs. Lulu Horning, for years an active worker in Portland and Gresham branches of the Women's Christian Temperance Union and in the Gresham lodge of the Eastern Star, died suddenly at her home near Gresham, Monday, from a heart attack.

Mrs. Horning had gone into a field, near her home, where her husband, C. O. Horning, was working, when she was stricken. Death was immediate.

Mrs. Horning was born at Belmont, Iowa, August 27, 1873.

She came to Oregon more than 30 years ago. She is survived by two brothers, both of Portland, H. V. and B. J. Rand, and two sisters, Mrs. Lucy Harbison of Morgan, Ore., and Mrs. Clelland of Portland. She is also survived by her three children, Lowell R. Horning, of Portland; Elizabeth Horning of Gresham and Mrs. D. George, of Denver, Colorado.

Funeral services were held on Thursday at Eldward Holman & Son, with interment in Lincoln Memorial Park.
