POMONA GRANGE WELL ATTENDED AND ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

Willows Grange Wins Attendance Banner

Morrow County Pomona Grange met at Lexington, on Saturday, Jan. 11, with Lexington Grange as host.

A morning session was held at which the various subordinate granges made reports, all showing active interest and growth in interest and membership.

County Agent, C. W. Smith, made an extensive report on agricultural meetings which he attended recently, stating plans, future meetings and activities of interest to wool, wheat and turkey growers, special emphasis being given to the marketing of agricultural products under the Federal Farm Marketing Act.

Agricultural committees and masters of the subordinate granges meeting with instructors from the Extension Service of our State Agricultural College is scheduled for February 11th at Boardman. Programs for each of the committees will be made up at that time to meet the need of each community where the granges are located.

The publicity committee, committee on Extension of Grange, Home Economics and Text Book committees gave interesting reports indicating that the granges are growing and filling a place in their respective communities.
