## SLAY RABBITS NOW SAYS COUNTY AGENT

Conditions for Extermination Declared Ideal

Cold weather and deep snow are essential to successful rabbit poisoning. Both conditions now are ideal and prompt action is necessary if present weather conditions are to be taken advantage of. There are usually only two times a year when the rabbits bunch; those are when the snow lies on the ground and when the green feeds are dried up. To attempt poisoning at any other time is a waste of time, money and effort, hence the importance of doing the job now that the conditions are ideal.

The rabbit population in Morrow County was reduced to such a point last year that there are not very many and they may not be given enough consideration. A few this year may mean many in the future. Now that there are so few in most sections a little extra effort at this time may mean to practically exterminate them. Cold weather will do its part by freezing those unable to get to feed because of deep snow. The rabbits which thrive under the present conditions. It could not be impossible to kill the few that remain if proper action is taken now.

Poison demonstrations will be put on at your farm by the County Agent if you will notify him of the place where the rabbits were bunched. He has strychnine for distribution and will assist in every possible way. Your cooperation is solicited in taking advantage of existing conditions. Rabbit poison baits are prepared by dumping ten pounds of chopped hay or leaves with enough water

to cause strychnine to adhere to it then dust with equal parts of strychnine sulphate where they are feeding on grain hay, dissolve one oz. of strychnine sulphate in six quarts of hot water and sprinkle over ten pounds of wheat or rye heads. The heads should be cut from the stems.

The bait should be placed in the trails in small amounts 50 to 200 feet from the stacks. A small amount is as effective as a lot and the danger of poisoning stock is lessened as it is usually all eaten by the rabbits. Any bits left when the weather moderates should be picked up and destroyed.

Quartz glass is installed in the windows of a hatching in England so that the ultra violet rays will induce birds to lay more eggs. Tests have shown that the process of incubation is thus speeded up. When a quartz mercury arc giving off ultra-violet rays was used in an incubator 20 per cent of the eggs were hatched from 24 to 48 hours sooner than other eggs treated by the rays.
