## MRS. CHAS. SHAVER DIES AT HOME IN IONE

Funeral at Caldwell, Idaho

Mrs. Mary Shaver, wife of Charles Shaver, died at her home in Ione at 11:30 a. m. Thursday, January 28th, following an illness of two weeks duration. Mrs. Shaver had been suffering from tonsillitis, but seemed to be much better when death came without warning. The friends who were caring for the sick woman had been trying during the two weeks of her illness to get word to her husband, who was assisting his brother, Albert, in well drilling, and was located sixty five miles out from Bend. Because of the deep snow and weather conditions, it was difficult to reach Mr. Shaver. He started for home as soon as the message reached him, leaving Bend Monday night and reaching Ione Tuesday evening on the stage. He did not that his wife had passed away until he arrived.

Mrs. Shaver was fifty years and eight months of age at the time of her death. She came west and she and Mr. Shaver were married in 1924.

She leaves to mourn her passing, besides her husband, her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Doblrow of Boise, Idaho. She was an active member of Bunchgrass Rebekah Lodge No. 91.

The body was shipped to Caldwell Wednesday night where funeral services will be held and interment made beside a sister who is buried there. The Rebekah Lodge of Caldwell will have charge of the funeral services. Mr. Charles Shaver, Mr. Albert Shaver and the little niece, Mild-Kelley, who has been attending school in Ione and making her home with Mrs. Shaver, accompanied the body. ### SCHOOL SAVINGS GROW

A total of 4,222,925 school children participated in school savings banking in the United States during the last school year, depositing \$28,072,496 and rolling up net savings of \$10,529,923, bringing total bank balances now credited to this movement to above 60 million dollars, according to the annual report of the Savings Bank division of the American Bankers Association. Schools to the number of 15,527 are enrolled in the plan.
