That in the column next following in said tabulation under the word "description," shows and properly alleges the description of the several tracts, herein referred to. That in the said description in every case the capital letters "N," "W," "S," "E" mean and are equivalent to the four points of the compass "North," "West," "South," "East," and in every case the abbreviation "R of W" means and is equivalent to the words "Right of Way" and in every case the abbreviation "Blk" means and is equivalent to the word "Block" and in every case the abbreviation "Inc." means and is equivalent to the word "Inclusive," and in every case the abbreviation "Gov't" means and is equivalent to the words "Government of the United States of America." Following each description in the said tabulation and reading from left to right therein, the column headed "Sec." indicates Section number, the column headed "Twp." means and indicates Township, and the letters N or S indicates North and South of the base line. In the column headed "Rg." means and indicates the Range East of the Willamette Meridian. The column headed with the word "Tax" indicates the amount in dollars and cents of tax due for which said certificates were issued upon the respective tracts referred to and set opposite said sum in the column headed "description." The words "Pen. and Int." indicates the penalty and interest accumulated upon the respective amounts from the date of delinquency to June 6th 1929, and in the column headed "Total" next following, indicates and correctly represents the total amount of tax due plaintiff for irrigation district taxes, together with penalty and interest to the 6th day of June 1929, upon the respective tracts therein described. In the column next following under the words "Assessed for the year" indicates and correctly represents the year for which said taxes were assessed, and for which said tax became due and delinquent, for which said certificates were issued.
